1 Models of dual and concurrent enrollment vary, but this Data Point focuses broadly on any courses taken during high school for postsecondary credit (as reported by students in survey questionnaires or recorded in high school transcripts). However, these courses do not include Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) courses, which may help students prepare for college and potentially earn postsecondary credit if they pass standardized AP or IB exams.

Dual Enrollment: Participation and Characteristics

In Dual Credit, a student is enrolled in a course which allows him/her to earn high school credit and college credit simultaneously. This course may be taught on a college campus or on a high school campus, but it will be in conjunction with a college or university.

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
