Code switching (also code-switching, CS) is the practice of moving back and forth between two languages or between two dialects or registers of the same language at one time. Code switching occurs far more often in conversation than in writing. It is also called code-mixing and style-shifting.

### **Code Switching Definition and Examples in Language**

In linguistics, code-switching or language alternation occurs when a speaker alternates between two or more languages, or language varieties, in the context of a single conversation. Multilinguals, speakers of more than one language, sometimes use elements of multiple languages when

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conversing with each other. Thus, code-switching is the use of more than one linguistic variety in a manner consistent with the syntax and phonology of each variety.

According to Grosjean (2010), code switching is a distinctive way of speaking in which the speaker

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switches back and forth between L1 and L2. During the switch, usually the speaker moves to the other language completely in search of "a word, phrase or sentence" and then returns to the root language (Grosjean, 2010, p. 743).

Code-switching is an age-old practice that is familiar to many Black people—and people of color—in the United States. Though when sociolinguist Einar Haugen coined the term in 1954, it was to describe language alternation, or the mixing of two or more languages, or dialects.
