He starts with the basics in Book 1: Humans are a higher form of animal, and animals respond to pleasure and pain. In Book 2, Section 3 he dismisses the misconception that virtuous people are "unaffected and undisturbed" by the desire to seek pleasure and avoid pain—they are still human. They still have desire and appetite.
